ITTF OVERVIEW

The International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) is the governing body of table tennis and has 226 affiliated member associations; the most of any International Sports Federation.

The ITTF holds over 100 events a year, seen live on TV in over 140 countries and currently has over 3 million social media followers, which makes table tennis one of the most followed sports on the planet.

The ITTF was initiated in Berlin, Germany and became formalized in London in 1926. Table tennis became an Olympic discipline at the 1988 Seoul Summer Olympic Games and a Paralympic discipline in 1960.

The current ITTF President is Mr.Thomas WEIKERT (GER) who was appointed in 2014 and elected in 2017.

HISTORY OF TABLE TENNIS

Table tennis started as a parlour game in Victorian England; it was an after-dinner entertainment for the upper-class society.

Gradually, the sport grew from a parlour game to a highly competitive activity. Interest began to fade around 1904, and it was not until its revival in the early 1920s that competition resumed on an ever-growing scale.

However, for the game to advance as a serious international sport, standards had to be developed, hence the formation of the ITTF in 1926, along with the first World Championships.

The first World Championships was organized in London in 1926, originally as a European Championships. There was a problem; a group of players from India wanted to compete; hastily just before play began, the name was changed to World Championships, but the poster advertising for the event remained as European Championships.

The game of table tennis has since gone from strength to strength, first appearing in the Olympic Games in 1988, and now is the second most played sport in the world.

BASIC TABLE TENNIS RULES

SCORING

In the World Championships, each singles match is best of 7 games; doubles matches are best of 5 games in the qualifications, and best of 7 games in the main draw.

The first player / doubles pair to reach 11 points wins the game, however a game must be won by at least a 2-point margin.

The edges of the table are part of the legal table surface, but not the sides.

FLOW OF THE MATCH

Each player serves 2 points in a row; then the service changes. However, if a score of 10-10 is reached in any game, then the service is alternate. After each game, the players change ends. In the final game, the players change ends when one of the players reaches 5 points.

LEGAL SERVICE

The ball must rest on an open hand palm of the hand and thrown vertically at least 6 inches and struck as the ball falls. The ball must bounce on the server's side and then on the opponent's side of the table. If the serve is legal, except that it touches the net, it is called a let serve and the serve is repeated.

EOUIPMENT

The racket must have a red and a black side. The ball must be white and 40 mm in diameter. The table is 2.74 meters long, 1.525 meters wide and 0.76 meters high.



A player's racket is tested randomly before each match, and opponents have the right to look at each other's rackets.

If a game lasts for more than 10 minutes, the expedite rule comes into action. Serving is alternate, if the receiver returned the 13th stroke in the rally, the receiver has won the point.

If a player strikes the ball below the wrist of the hand that is holding the racket, the point is legal.

If a player hits the ball around the net and it still lands legally on the table, the shot is valid.

HOST CITY

2019 WTTC PLAYING SYSTEM

L. STRUCTURE

- 1.1 There will be 5 individual events - Men's Singles, Women's Singles, Men's Doubles. Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles
- 12 The first round proper of Men's Singles and Women's Singles will have 128 places and the first round proper of Men's Doubles. Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles will have 64 places.
- 13 Singles events will have 64 seeded players and 64 qualifiers. Doubles events will have 32 seeded pairs and 32 qualifiers.
- 14 Qualification for singles will comprise groups of 3 or 4. If there are more than 64 groups a knockout round will be played to determine qualifiers. If there are less than 64 groups all group winners will qualify for the main draw together with some second placed players as lucky losers.
- 15 Oualification for doubles will be by knockout.
- 1.6 All singles matches will be best of 7 games. Doubles matches will be best of 5 games in qualification matches and best of 7 games in the main draw.

2. DRAW

2.1 Singles


- 2.1.1 Singles groups will comprise 3 (or 4) players with each group winner proceeding to a qualification knockout draw (if more than 64 groups) or first round proper. The draw for the groups will use a snake system.
- 212 The draw for the first round proper will have 2 stages with the first stage split. The initial first stage draw will take place on Friday 19 April 2019 and draw the players seeded 17 – 32 and 33 – 64 into appropriate positions at random. The final first stage draw will occur on Saturday 20 April 2019 (separately from the initial first stage draw) when seeds I - 16 will be drawn. Seeds 9 - 16 will be drawn first, followed by seeds 5 - 8, then seeds 3 - 4 and finally seeds 1 and 2.
- 2.1.3 The second stage draws of qualifiers will be drawn following the completion of the qualification rounds and be drawn at random into the remaining 64 positions, subject to clause 2.3.

2. DRAW

2.2 Doubles

- 2.2.1 The initial draw for the first round proper will take place on Friday 19 April 2019 when the seeded players will be drawn into appropriate positions.
- 2.2.2 The second stage draws of qualifiers will be drawn following the completion of the qualification rounds and be drawn at random into the remaining 32 positions, subject to clause 2.3.
- 2.3 Players of the same Association shall be separated according to 3.6.3.1, 3.6.3.3, 3.6.3.4 and 3.6.3.5 only in preliminary rounds and groups and in the first round of the draw but not in further rounds.

The World Ranking list which will be used for seeding and for the draws shall be the WR to be published in April 2019 (No.4).



FAN Zhendona (CHN)

AGE 22

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Runner-up (2017)

Fun Fact Holding the top spot in the Men's World Rankings for 12 consecutive months, top seeded Fan has collected many prestigious trophies in his career including two Men's World Cup titles (2016 & 2018), as well as the recent 2019 Asian Cup.





XU Xin (CHN) AGE 29 WR 2

Playing Style Left handed attacking penhold Best WTTC Result Semifinals (2013, 2017) Fun Fact Former World no.1, winner of three Men's World Cups and 14 ITTF World Tour singles titles, Xu is without doubt one of the finest athletes China has to offer. He is also the leading name in the art of the penhold grip.

LIN Gaoyuan (CHN)

WR 3 AGE 24

Playing Style Left handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 16 (2017)

Fun Fact Lin has been making significant progress on the World Rankings, with his most recent win being the Hungarian Open earlier this year. He was also a member of the Chinese team that won at the 2018 Team World Cup and 2018 World Team Championships.





Tomokazu HARIMOTO (JPN) WR 4 AGE 15

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Ouarterfinals (2017)

Fun Fact Touted as a Table Tennis prodigy, Harimoto is not only the youngest winner of an ITTF World Tour Men's Singles title but also the youngest winner of the ITTF World Tour Grand Finals. He also became the youngest World Championships quarterfinalist at 13 years old in Düsseldorf in 2017.

Timo BOLL (GER)

WR 5 AGE 38

Playing Style Left handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Semifinals (2011)
Fun Fact Boll has 19 World Tour singles gold medals, a record 7 European Championships singles titles, 13 titles at the German National Championships and has also lifted the Men's World Cup trophy twice.





LEE Sangsu (KOR)

WR 6 AGE 28

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Semifinals (2017) Fun Fact Top player in the Korean team, Lee is a winner of two ITTF World Tour Men's singles titles, and took home Men's Singles bronze 2017. He married his 2013 World Championships Mixed Doubles partner Park Youngsuk in December 2018.

Hugo CALDERANO (BRA)

WR 7 AGE 22

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 32 (2017)

Fun Fact Calderano is the first ever Latin American player to reach the Top 10 ITTF World Rankings. Outside of the sport, he can also solve the Rubik's cube in an average of I I seconds and has a collection of over 70 cubes in different shapes and sizes.





Koki NIWA (JPN)

WR 8 AGE 24

Playing Style Left handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Quarterfinals (2017)

Fun Fact Niwa is known for his lightning quick speed around the table and has amassed significant global support with his gold medal successes at a young age at the 2010 Youth Olympic Games and 2011 World Junior Championships.

LIANG Jingkun (CHN)

WR 9 AGE 22

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 32 (2015)

Fun Fact Making only his second World Championships appearance, Liang is looking to better his third round finish in 2015. Last year he won his first Men's Singles title at the 2018 ITTF World Tour Austrian Open and continues to develop into a major force in the Chinese setup.





JANG Woojin (KOR)

WR 10 AGE 23

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 32 (2017)
Fun Fact Jang became the first ever triple Champion at an ITTF World Tour event when he won Men's Singles, Men's Doubles with Lim Jonghoon (KOR), and Mixed Doubles with DPR Korea's Cha Hyo Sim at the 2018 Korean Open.

MA Long (CHN)

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand
Best WTTC Result Champion (2015, 2017)

Fun Fact While he was kept out of competing for most of 2018 due to a knee injury, the Dragon marked his comeback with a win in the recently concluded ITTF World Tour Qatar Open. Outside of his successful career, Ma also welcomed a baby boy to his family in December 2017.





Dimitrij OVTCHAROV (GER)

WR 12 AGE 30

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 16 (2009, 2011, 2013) Fun Fact Standing shoulder-to-shoulder with Boll as one of Germany's finest-ever competitors, Ovtcharov is a two-time European champion, winner of nine ITTF World Tour Men's Singles titles and became only the second player from his country to be named World no.1 in January 2018.

Jun MIZUTANI (JPN)

WR 13 AGE 29

Playing Style Left handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Quarterfinals (2011, 2015)
Fun Fact Ten times winner of the All Japan National Championships, Jun Mizutani toppled some of the sport's finest players over the years and became the first table tennis player from Japan to win a singles medal at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games.



WONG Chun Ting (HKG)

WR 14 AGE 27

Playing Style Right handed attacking penhold Best WTTC Result Quarterfinals (2017)

Fun Fact Taking up the sport aged six the Hong Kong star has gone on to become one of the top penhold grip players the sport has to offer. His biggest success in singles to date came at the 2016 Men's World Cup, reaching the third step of the podium.

Liam PITCHFORD (ENG)

WR 15 AGE 25

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 32 (2015)

Fun Fact On the back of a string of fine performances Pitchford achieved a personal best ranking in April 2019, rising to 15th position. He was also a key player in England's famous bronze medal finishes at the 2016 World Team Championships and 2018 Team World Cup.





Mattias FALCK (SWE)

WR 16 AGE 27

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 32 (2017)

Fun Fact Twice a medallist on the continental stage the short pimple player has gone on to establish himself as one of the world's top names. Falck helped his native Sweden to a bronze medal finish at the 2018 World Team Championships and recently took home the runner-up medal at the ITTF Challenge Plus Oman Open.

Vladimir SAMSONOV (BLR)

WR 19 AGE 43

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Runner-up (1997)

Fun Fact The evergreen legend of table tennis, Samsonov holds the record number of 27 World Tour Singles titles won, alongside Ma Long, He was awarded the order of honour by the President of Belarus in 2017 for his achievements in sports.





Quadri ARUNA (NGR)

WR 23 AGE 30

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 64 (2017) Fun Fact Aruna became the first African to reach the quarterfinals at the Olympic table tennis event when he shocked several big names of the sport in Rio 2016. He won the ITTF Male Table Tennis Star award in 2014.

Sathiyan GNANASEKARAN (IND)

WR 28 AGE 26

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 64 (2015)

Fun Fact The highest ranked player on the Indian team, Gnanasekaran was a key member of the Indian men's team that won Gold at the 2018 Commonwealth Games. He also shocked world #14 Wong Chun Ting at the recent 2019 ITT-ATTU Asian Cup to finish number six.





Simon GAUZY (FRA)

WR 34 AGE 24

Playing Style Right handed attacking shakehand Best WTTC Result Round of 64 (2013, 2015, 2017) Fun Fact Top player in the French team, Gauzy achieved his first major breakthrough when he reached the finals at the 2016 ITTF-European Championships for the first time. he became a father this year, after his son was born in January.



WOMEN'S SINGLES - GEIST PRIZE

The Geist Prize awarded to the Women's Singles Championship was donated in 1931 by President of the Hungarian Table Tennis Association, Dr. Gaspar Geist.

MEN'S DOUBLES - IRAN CUP

The Iran Cup awarded to the Men's Doubles World Champions, was donated at the 1947 World Championships by the Shah of Iran.





WOMEN'S DOUBLES - W I POPE TROPHY

The W.J.Pope Trophy awarded to the Women's Doubles World Champions, was donated in 1948 by W.J.Pope of England, who at the time was the ITTF Honorary General Secretary.



#ITTFWORLDS2019 TABLE

Based on the "Rainbow Table" model, the 2019 WTTC show court table is designed with undercarriage insert bases featuring dark green patterns with Hungarian characteristics and the WTTC logo. It is an embodiment of good harmony between a table and the WTTC visual identity design.

Two layers of an insert base make their own patterns clearer and more visualized when combined. In addition, both tabletops and undercarriages have light bars on their back, adjusted to lighting intensity in the arena. A dimmer for its lighting bars will make it better integrated into the settings and overall visual identity design of the arena.

The color of tabletops continues to be black this time, same as that for German WTTC. It contributes to not only a better visual effect but also greater attention of athletes to the white ball and their better performance during matches as black and white are visually in a sharp contrast. Gold, the color of undercarriages, stands for hard work of athletes and their pursuit of gold medals. Also, its metallic feel will enhance the visual effect of the arena.



2019 WTTC INTERESTING FACTS

- The last time Budapest hosted the World Table Tennis Championships was in 1950.
- Youngest Women's Singles Champion: Deng Yaping (CHN), 18 years and 90 days old at the 1991 WTTC.
- Youngest Women's Doubles Champion: Deng Yaping (CHN), 16 years and 63 days old at the 1989 WTTC.
- Youngest Men's Singles Champion: Richard Bergmann (AUT), 17 years and 303 days old at the 1937 WTTC.
- Youngest Men's Doubles Champion: Kong Linghui (CHN), 21 years and 201 days old at the 1997 WTTC.
- Youngest Mixed Doubles Champion: Guo Yue (CHN), 16 years and 294 days old at the 2005 WTTC.
- Victor Barna (HUN) holds the Men's Singles record of winning the title five times.
- Angelica Rozeanu (ROU) holds the Women's Singles record winning the title six consecutive times, (1950-1955).
- Victor Barna and Miklos Szabados (HUN) hold the Men's Doubles record winning the title in 6 out of 7 years beginning in 1929. Barna also won in 1933 with Sandor Glancz and again in 1939 with Richard Bergmann.
- Maria Mednyanszky and Anna Sipos (HUN) hold the Women's Doubles record winning the title at 6 consecutive World Championships (1930-1935).
- Maria Mednyanszky partnered with Mechlovits (1926,1928), Szabados (1930,1931,1933) and Kelen (1933) to win the Mixed Doubles World Title a record 6 times.
- Hungarry's István Jónyer won the last title for Hungary, when he took Gold in 1975 in Calcutta (IND).
- China's Xu Xin & Korea Republic's Yang Haeun won the Mixed Doubles World Title on their first partnership in 2015 to become the first mixed associations mixed doubles pair to be crowned since 1966.
- China has spawned eleven Men's Singles World Champions, all have been right handers.
- Only three left handers have won the World Championship in Men Singles event: Stellan Bengtsson (SWE) in 1971, Seiji Ono (JPN) in 1979 and Jean-Philippe Gatien, (FRA) in 1993.
- China's Ding Ning will be aiming to be the first Chinese player to win four World Championship singles titles.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

The media is an essential part of the success of the World Championships, so the ITTF wants to create the best possible atmosphere for the media to work.

In return, the ITTF asks the media to adhere to the below guidelines to ensure that the players, spectators, TV viewers and competition management will also have the best event possible.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

- Photographers are only allowed onto the field of play (FoP) with an official bib issued by the organizing committee.
- A bib can be obtained at the welcome desk with a €20 / HUF 6,000 deposit.
 This bib must be returned at the end of each day.
- Any photographers / accredited press on the FoP without a bib will be asked to leave immediately.
- Only a limited number of photographers will be allowed on the FoP. This
 will be determined by level of importance, then a first come, first served
 basis. If you are unable to enter the FoP, the ITTF will provide your agency
 with the photos that you need. Photographers will be able to take photos
 from the tribune.
- Only photographers with professional cameras will be given an official bib to enter the FoP.
- As photographers are seen by spectators and on television, they are required to dress presentably whilst on the FoP (collared shirt / blouse, long pants / skirts and covered shoes).
- Each day there will be a diagram indicating where photographers are allowed on the FoP. Photographers found outside this area will be asked to leave the FoP.
- Photographers are required to bring their own stool / chairs onto the FoP and are kindly asked to sit while taking photos.
- Photographers must not bring anything except their camera and one spare lens onto the FoP. No laptop and no bags are permitted.
- Photographers are not allowed to move during or in between points.
- · Photographers can only move during time outs and in between games.
- · Strictly no flash photography is allowed on the FoP.
- Photographers are not allowed in the mixed zone.
- Photographers are allowed to take photos from the press tribune if they are not disrupting anyone.
- Photographers are only permitted to take still pictures and not videos.
- The Organizing Committee (OC) will provide secured, lockable storage for your equipment.

MIXED ZONE

The priority for accredited media's access to players and officials in the mixed zone will be as follows:

- Host Broadcaster
- Television Rights holders
- ITTF Interviews
- · Televisions Non-rights holders
- Radio Interviews
- Written Press

There will be set areas for each of the above categories, with the higher priority media getting access to the players first.

FILMING RIGHTS FOR FIELD OF PLAY AND MIXED ZONE

Please find below the explanation of the different material that ENG crews & Video Journalists can or cannot film during the World Championships:

I. All Crews Have the Right to Film:

- Press conferences following the Draw and after the main matches (note all filming must be done at the back of the room on the designated platforms).
- Interviews in the mixed zone
- Private interviews in the interview room

Non-rights holders may NOT film match action on the FoP. If non-TV rights holders would like to have access to match footages, they must contact ITTF Marketing & Events Manager Mr SEET Cheng Howe: chenghowe@ittf.com.

2. Rights Holders Have the Right to Film:

- Match action on the FoP, proving they have permission from the HB that they are not disrupting the world feed.
- Presentations, training and warm up on the FoP.
- One-to-one Interviews:
- After the Draw
- After each press conference
- Training in the training hall.

Any unauthorized filming may result in the revoking of the relevant media accreditation.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

MEDIA CENTRE AND PRESS TRIBUNE

Only accredited media are permitted into the media centre & press tribune and are not allowed to bring in guests.

As there are limited seats in the press tribune, there will be an order of priority given to media that are allowed access

As the media centre is a place for work, media must keep the noise to a minimum.

There will be lockers provided for photographers to store their equipment in the media centre

GENERAL

Television, radio, or written interviews may only take place in the mixed zone (after matches), in the interview room and during the press conference.

If the accredited media would like to have a one-to-one interview with a player, they must organize this through the OC press team or the ITTF Events & Marketing Manager (contact details, please see below), and should not approach the player themselves outside the mixed zone or press conference room.

The OC Media operations staff will manage all photographers onsite and be present to assist photographers with queries, photo position placement and will enforce the guidelines stated herein.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ACCREDITATION

Address: Hungexpo, Entry Hall III., through Gate nr. 6 Opening hours; from 8 A.M. until 10 P.M. (between 20.04 & 28.04)

After you collected the accreditation pass by proving yourself with an ID or Passport or Press card you can enter the venue through the main entrance as well.

SHOPS, GOVERNMENT OFFICES, BANKS

Standard business hours for government offices and banks on weekdays are from 8:00 to 16:00. These offices are normally closed on Saturday and Sunday.

Business hours for shops from Monday to Friday are from 7:00 to 20:00. Most of the shops are also open on Saturday (from 7:00 to 18:00) and Sunday (8:00 to 18:00) as well. There are shops which are open 24/7.

FLECTRICITY

The voltage of Hungarian electric networks is 220 V (F wall sockets are used).

MONEY / CURRENCY

Hungarian Forints (HUF) are the official currency of Hungary since I August 1946.

Currently, the following coins and banknotes are in use: Coins: 5: 10: 20: 50: 100: 200 HUF

Banknotes: 500: 1000: 2000: 5000: 10.000: 20.000 HUF

TIME ZONE

The time zone in Budapest during the World Table Tennis Championships will be Central European Time GMT+2.

CLIMATE

The climate of Budapest, the capital of Hungary, is continental, with cold winters and warm summers. April in Budapest, Hungary, is spring and with very pleasant weather, the city and its activities are in full bloom

The average maximum daytime temperature in April is an enjoyable 15°C and the average minimum night time temperature is 6°C. Both those temperatures increase greatly in the course of the month, and approaching April 30 the weather turns significantly warmer with temperatures of 19°C during the day and 8°C during the night.

MEDIA SERVICES

To facilitate the work of journalists, the venue provides the following: Press centre / Lockers / Mixed Zone / Tabled workstations at the tribunes / Venue photo positions / Telecommunication services

Media Centre

Venue press centre will be equipped with free wired and wireless network for written press, TV and photographers. The wireless networks will cover all working areas, including the commentary positions, media tribune, mixed zones and the photo work areas.

The work area of the press centre offers workplaces equipped with free-to-use computers with connected printers as well as workplaces which allow journalists to connect their own devices to power supply and the Internet. It is also equipped with information desk, where the latest information on the competition and events will be obtained.

Lockers are available for personal use at the Press Centre (for €20 / HUF 6,000 deposit in cash).

Opening hours: The Press Center opens two hours before the start of the tournament and closes two hours after the last match finishes

Media Tribune

Services: 170 seats with table / Cable internet / Wifi / Power supply

PHOTOGRAPHERS

All photographers should check with Venue Photo Manager for any venue specific regulations. Photographers are obliged to wear bibs during the entire competition, which will be distributed at the Media Information Desk, Bibs will be available with a €20 / HUF 6.000 deposit.

There will be a "No bag policy" in place in all competition areas. Lockers will be available for personal use at the Media Centre, Keys to lockers can be obtained against €20 / HUF 6.000 deposit in cash.

Photographers are not allowed in the mixed zone where shooting is prohibited.

In accredited areas a strict NO SMOKING policy applies.

Any breach of the regulations listed above would leave an immediate withdrawal of the accreditation.

Photographers' Brief

Photographers briefing is mandatory for all accredited photographers. If any photographer comes on a later day and misses the first day briefing, then they need to be briefed individually on the rules and requirements with the photo manager.

Dress Code:

Photographers are obliged to wear a bib properly during all the competitions. Photographers should wear proper clothing at all times.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

From Airport to City Center

200F

From 4:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., bus number 200E commutes between Terminal 2 and the Kőbánya-Kispest metro terminal (metro line M3), via the Ferihegy train station(trains to the Nyugati railway station in Budapest).

From the Kőbánya-Kispest metro terminal, passengers can take the M3 metro towards Újpest Központ to reach the city center. It is possible to change to metro lines M1 and M2 at the Deák Ferenc tér stop in the inner city. The metro line M2 (red) towards Örs Vezér tere travels to the main venue and to the accreditation centre (Hungexpo), lust take off at the endstation called Örs Vezér tere and take the bus number 10 take off at Vásárközpont, főbejárat. From there you will see the buildings of Hungexpo, signages will also help your way.

From 11:00 p.m.to 1:00 a.m. bus 200E, from 1:00 a.m. to 4:00 a.m. night bus number 900 operates between Budapest Airport Terminal 2 and the South Pest bus garage. It is possible to change to night buses 950 and 950A, operating to the inner city.

100F

As of 7 July, a direct bus line connecting the airport with the city center was introduced: the front-door 100E takes passengers to Deák tér. It leaves from Deák tér every thirty minutes from 04:00 to 23:30. The first bus leaves from the airport each morning at 05:00, and the last one at 0:30. Bus 100E stops at the BKK bus stop at the airport between the two terminals on the arrival level

Passengers may get off the bus going to Deák tér at Kálvin tér and at Astoria. Bus 100E going to the airport only stops at Kálvin tér, but the first two in the morning will also stop at the Astoria M bus stop.

If you took off at the Deák tér, the metro line M2 (red) towards Örs Vezér tere travels to the main venue and to the accreditation centre (Hungexpo). Just take off at the endstation called Örs Vezér tere and take the bus number 10 take off at Vásárközpont, főbejárat. From there you will see the buildings of Hungexpo, signages will also help your way.

General Information for Entering Hungary

Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden, Norway, Iceland, Switzerland and Lichtenstein. Hungary issues visas in 89 countries, while in 67 countries Hungary is represented by other Member States for issuing visa.



MIXED ZONE DETAILED MAP





